Three Cheers for Edna Barclay – an extraordinary lady who has achieved and given so much to her fellow Seniors and the community of Riddells Creek.





REGISTER YOUR BURN-OFF

As part of your preparation for the upcoming fire season, if you're planning on doing any burning off there's a few things you must do:

Before burning off

- Check and follow local regulations or laws set down by CFA or your local council.
- Notify neighbors at least two hours before starting the burn.
- Check the weather forecast for the day of the burn and a few days afterwards.
- · Check the fuel moisture conditions.
- Establish a fire break of no less than three meters cleared of all flammable material.
- Make sure there are enough people to monitor, contain and extinguish the burn safely.

1300 555 727 and ask for information to be relayed to ESTA via 1800 668 511.

If burn off information is lodged into the system it helps mitigate brigades being called out unnecessarily.

TURN OUTS

Since writing the September article the brigade has responded to 4 turn outs. One incident in Riddells and three support calls to Sunbury, Gisborne and Romsey.

Year to date, the brigade has been responded to a total of 81 incidents, 2 fewer incidents than last year.

Can you suggest anything/anyone we can share those items with?



NBN FRUSTRATION IN RIDDELLS CREEK

Recently, I sent an email to the Hon Paul Fletcher MP, Minister for Communications, Urban Infrastructure, Cities and the Arts expressing concerns about NBN roll out in Riddells Creek. Here is an extract of what was sent to the Minister. If you are inclined to express your views to the Minister, email minister@communications.gov.au

Dear Minister,

I am emailing you as a last resort in relation to the NBN rollout in our town Riddells Creek, Vic 3431. The telecommunication ombudsman's office has been unable to assist us due to NBN being a private company. Since the federal government committed to rolling out NBN and has stated on many occasions that the roll out is complete, I wish to correct this statement.

For 5 years, our town has been provided with several expected NBN rollout time frames with ever moving targets. Half our town is on the NBN infrastructure and the remainder of us are not. Just a few weeks ago, our expected NBN implementation was moved out another three months.


The unfortunate pandemic has created the need to rely on stable and reliable telecommunications network to conduct our work from home. I am concerned that the current situation with unworkably slow internet speed and constant drop outs is not sustainable to operate our business.

I ask you, as the federal communication minister, to resolve the never-ending implementation of NBN to remaining Riddells Creek households. Given we are only 50km north of Melbourne, I do expect a better service and communication engagement than what we have received to date.

MAKING IT ALL WORTHWILE

I met Pat at the Riddells Creek Farmers Market in April 2021. It was only the second market Kate and I had been to with the Riddell Fudge Factory and we were excited to be selling our fudge to raise money for The Code 9 Foundation.

I was stamping my feet in the cold when Pat, his family and their chocolate coloured Labrador visited our stand. Pat had noticed our sign for The Code 9 Foundation and as I started to talk to him about it, he quietly mentioned that he was a member.

As we chatted, Pat said he started getting to know The Code 9 Foundation in 2017. Pat was a member of Victoria Police and stationed at Kyneton when the police car he was in was rammed off the road by a stolen 4WD. Pat broke his neck and during his recovery from this trauma, PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) started. He was a member of VicPol between 2011 and 2019.

Lucy was trained by Assistance Dogs Australia at their training centre in New South Wales and came into Pat's life in June 2020. Pat had to attend a ten day training course at the centre before bringing Lucy home. I asked if Lucy bonded with him quickly and Pat said it took a little while as she is a boisterous dog. It was fairly overwhelming at first but they managed to settle in with each other once they were home. Now Pat and Lucy go everywhere together.

Training assistance dogs like Lucy is very expensive and time consuming, costing \$40,000 and taking two years. The Code 9 Foundation provides support for first responders like Pat in many ways, as well as raising money to train assistance dogs for members.

I asked if it was okay to say hello to Lucy and yes, I can confirm she is very loving and boisterous! As I was shaking her paw, Pat said 'She has changed my life'. That makes what Kate and I are doing all worthwhile.

HISTORY OF MECHANICS HALL

This is the final part of the history of the hall. I have had great pleasure in the writing, including extra research to enhance the information in the minutes. Indeed I feel privileged to have been asked to do so.

We are now in the 1970s and the main users of the hall were the Elderly Citizens, the RSL and the YMC, who were 38 weeks behind with hire payments. It was decided that a full length cupboard with a hinged seat be built along the rear wall of the hall. Also the purchase of a new sink in the kitchen. Mr. De Silva to be contacted regarding the required works, including a sink and two cupboards in the Elderly Citizens room. In 1971 Mrs. Dixon retired from the Committee.

In December a surcharge of \$5.00 was put on the Hall Hire to be refunded if Hall left clean and tidy, although a caretaker was employed to ensure that the Hall was clean after use with \$75.00 available for extra cleaning. A draughtsman was to draw up plans for repairs to the roof. Romsey Shire to be requested to call for tenders for roof repair. In 1972 a letter was sent to Council questioning why the Hall received only \$1.00 for \$1.00 grant and The Elderly Citizens received \$10.00. A letter to the YMC stating that they have 14 days to pay back their rent debt of \$100.00. The same letter to be sent to RDFL also, requesting \$50.00 to bring them up to date.

In August 1972 a new Committee was elected. Members were Crs. Poulton, Mashiter, Knewstub, Messrs Hogan, Skilicorn, Baker and Wheeler. Miss Amess sent an apology. In March 1973 an application was made to Romsey Council for permission to hold a raffle for fundraising for the hall renovations and

park maintenance. In 1973 the lease with the YMC was to be terminated unless their outstanding rent was paid. The RDFL still owed \$50.00 rent. Mr. Turner was to be paid \$80.00 as caretaker. In February 1976 the Primary School used the hall free of charge for temporary accommodation.

In April 1976 \$75.00 was received from the R.D.F.L. and \$75.00 from Romsey Shire for the Elderly Citizens hall hire. In July 1976 the Youth Club paid up their outstanding rent. In August the school was charged \$5.00 (hourly, weekly?) to be paid at the end of the year.

Immunisations were also conducted at the Hall. Riddells Creek Community Care was interested in painting the hall. Unfortunately a great deal of damage was done to the Hall in September and the local constable was called in. Ash trays were to be made from halved 4 gallon drums and nailed to the floor! The Lions Club were to hire the Hall and also offered to paint the hall. Riddells Creek Sunday School donated \$50.00 to the project.

In 1977 a grant of \$1,840.00 was received from the Council for hall heating. Also Riddells Creek Playgroup was using the Hall. In 1978 Council put up a wire fence between the toilets for security. Some members stayed on this committee into the 1980s, as new members were elected every three years and as members retired. In my observation during my writing, the main focus of all the committees was the preservation of the building, sometimes under difficult circumstances including wilful damage, lack of funds and support and hirers not paying the charges and not cleaning the building after use. Nevertheless, they kept persevering to preserve the building.

My gratitude and admiration goes to all past committees. Without these volunteers, we would not have a beautiful historical building in the middle of Riddells Creek.

Taking care of our local environment

A NOT SO SIMPLE SPRING

Spring is the simple season. It says 'Grow'. It says: breakout, bud and flower, push to the light that lengthens each day, go to the warmth. Don't mind the reversals to cold weather, keep going. Grow! That frisky feeling, that's Spring – make the most of it!

Our times are not so simple. We are locked in, so don't go out, don't stretch your fingers toward others. And with the warm weather starting so soon in the year, beware of summer, advancing in increments, bearing we do not know what fate. In this particular rotation around the sun, we have learned that what we thought was normal is set about with assumptions we had not noticed until they were upended.

Still, it's Spring, and I am amazed. The Acacia dealbata is already on the wane, but here beside it is a fine-leaved acacia whose name I don't know about to burst into flower, golden yellow licking up the plant like a new fire in dry kindling. In the Blackwoods, the big buds of flower are out, a restrained yellow you could say except that the whole of the plant is bursting, every branch, from top to bottom, an excitation of flowers. The Blackwood is an unobtrusive tree of modest stature, but it sure knows how to flower.

This morning, I went looking for the Ovens Valley wattle I had seen yesterday in Barrm Birrm. Along one of the lateral tracks I head, then up, through a band of Prickly Moses, and there they are, wending their way from the damp country above the cemetery, spreading steadily along the slope. Cascades of pale yellow, but my deep apologies, living plant, you are not from here. I must bid you adieu with the short sharp pruning saw that sits on my hip.



A few months ago, our Landcare group looked at our term deposit and decided there were better things it could be doing than earning almost no interest. We engaged

contractors to poison the exotic wattles in Barrm Birrm, and in a sweep from the northern end, they made it almost to the cemetery. I'm out mopping up the stragglers. After that, we will hold that line, year by year, each not so simple Spring walking gently through the bush, eyes alert for the flare of yellow that shows the young seedlings, ready to discourage them ... with a firm tug that bares the roots.

PLANTING TREES THIS SPRING?

Remember to plan before you plant

Greater Western Water is reminding the Riddells Creek community to be careful where they plant trees this spring.

While trees provide welcome shade and habitat for wildlife, underground can be a different story with tree roots causing a lot of damage to pipes. Thirsty tree roots seeking moisture tend to gravitate towards underground pipes and can eventually penetrate them causing blockages and even spills. In fact, tree roots are a leading cause of sewer blockages across the region.



The best way to prevent issues from tree roots is to choose trees with non-invasive root systems and to plant away from the underground infrastructure. Using root barriers can also help minimise damage. A good rule of thumb is that tree roots extend about 1.5 times the distance of its branches.

Customers can also contact Greater Western Water or go online to Dial Before You Dig to find out where pipes are located on their property.

So if you're planting trees this spring, a little planning first can help prevent costly issues down the track.

IN MY GARDEN

Spring rolls on and the last half dozen of the 100 red tulips I planted over a decade ago are about to bloom. I think the other 90 failed because they were baked to death over summer. Other bulbs to do well here are all the daffodils, grape hyacinths, pineapple lilies, ixias, arums, scilla and gladiolus. Actually, the spring flowering Gladiolus cardinalis 'Amanda Mahy' is budding up nicely and will soon be a blaze of tangerine! It's a great undemanding bulb that has multiplied nicely and is a welcome burst of colour when it blooms.

Elsewhere in the garden the wattles are finishing and the odd blob of lilac on the ground proves to be one of the carpobrotus flowers; it is doing a great job as a weed suppressing ground cover. The berberis is coming into its purplish bronze leaves and soon the smoke bush will be bursting into leaf too. My succulent collection is waking up too with many of them flowering now. I have cute little hanging blooms on my echeverias in red, orange and yellow, most of the sedums are yellow and my aeoniums are all yellow except for one which is white. Most succulent enthusiasts will



tell you to cut off the flowers because they attract aphids but it's up to you. I like to let mine bloom!

In the vegetable garden (if I had one) I would be taking the opportunity to dig compost and manure into the beds in readiness for the summer seedling planting blitz in late October. It's always a conundrum to know how long to leave the winter crops before you need to plant the summer crops! And that white variegated Hebe 'Abbey Rose' that stressed a brilliant hot pink? As soon as I moved the pot up against the house the plant began to lose its colour. So the small amount of shelter and warmth radiating off the house helped it to become less stressed. It is almost completely back to being green and white again!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

My favourite soup this winter is zucchini soup, it is so quick and easy to prepare and tastes delicious.

ZUCCHINI SOUP

1 onion, finely diced
1 clove of garlic, crushed
500g zucchini cut into pieces
2 potatoes, peeled and cut into pieces
500ml water
1 tsp vegetable stock

50g cream cheese

Salt and pepper to taste

1 pinch ground black pepper

Cook onion and garlic in a small amount of olive oil till soft. Add zucchini, potato, water, stock, salt and pepper and cook until tender. Add cream cheese and blend with a hand blender until smooth. Serve hot with crusty bread.

INFORMATION SESSIONS



For those preferring to receive help at home rather than go into an aged facility as they get older, the government's 'Home Care Package' scheme provides an allocation of funds to individuals to access services which will enable them to live safely and independently at home.

One of the federal government's responses to the Royal Commission into aged care back in May was to announce the allocation of 80,000 extra home care packages over the next two years.

Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health has been a Home Care Package provider in Sunbury for the last four years and it is expanding its service to include residents of the Macedon

RIDDELL COUNTRY PRACTICE HEALTH ADVICE

WHAT IS THIS RASH DOC?

It started a couple of days ago, like a burning, tingling area on one side of my body. Then it felt like an ant bite, but there was nothing to see till today. Now I have red spots, like pimples and blisters tracking in a line, they look like chicken pox.

Funny about that, because that's pretty much what it is, but it's called 'shingles' or 'Varicella Zoster' and it is in the family of herpes viruses.

It's more common as we get older, and is due to the 'old' chicken pox virus getting reactivated. The virus travels to the



skin's surface along a nerve root, which is why it can hurt so much. Unfortunately our immune system can let us down as we get older.

What is scary about shingles is that the nerve pain can persist long after the rash goes away (usually after 1-2 weeks). This is called post herpetic neuralgia and can be difficult to treat.

There is some good news, we can treat the rash. If treatment is started early, antiviral drugs like Acylovir, can quicken the healing.

Prevention is possible too, with a vaccination available that is targeted to people who are over 60 years of age. This vaccine is called Zostavax and can reduce the risk of getting shingles by 70% by boosting our immunity.



AUSTRALIA'S HISTORY THROUGH THE PAGES OF THE RIDDELL ROUNDUP

Historians and history students are familiar with the concept of a 'primary source'. This term is used to describe any form of historical evidence that was made at the time of the events you are studying. It can be anything - a photo, artwork, letter, engraving, official record, diary, newspaper, video, computer file, gravestone, or even an 'artefact' (an object from the era).

Historians examine primary sources to try to understand the people, events and social norms of the time and place they are studying.

Over the last two years, the COVID-19 pandemic has been stitched through the pages of the Roundup.

In 2000, the Walks for Reconciliation in Sydney (250,000 people) and Melbourne (300,000) marked a turning point in Australia's understanding of its past. In 2001, that understanding was being reflected in the work of Riddells Creek school children.

- The community spirit, with toys in trees and lockdown strategies.
- The sad interruptions to local sport and community activities.
- The dining-inside/dining-outside/take-away shuffle for our pub, restaurants and cafes.
- The creativity and innovation which led to workingfrom-home, learning-from-home, scouting-from-home, community-grouping-from-home...
- The challenges for many small businesses, with suddenly either too much work or too little.
- The leadership, kindness, stoicism and courage of so many of the people who live and work in Riddells Creek.

Future historians could well use the Roundup to understand how the pandemic was experienced by a community.

Old copies of the Riddell Roundup are also rich primary sources which shine a light on how major historical events and social changes over the last 30 years were experienced within our little corner of the world. Here's just a sample.

far down the moisture has actually penetrated. This is the only sure way to see if your watering is effective or not!

A final word about the drought. Don't prune anything really hard for the next few months — there is not enough water around to help a plant to recover from such an ordeal. Don't plant anything in the garden unless you are very sure you will be there every day to water it and help get it established. Raise the height of your mower blades on what little grass is left. It will come back in autumn when we get rain!

Gas Rollout

Dear Friends

This is a very exciting time for our community with the rollout of natural gas taking shape. The maps indicating the initial reticulation area have now been released for each town.

While your property may not be included in this initial rollout it is important to keep in mind that this is the beginning of the reticulation process, not the end, and the expansion of this network will continue for several years to come. Regardless of whether or not you are in this initial reticulation, it is critical that if you wish to be connected to gas you contact an energy retailer as soon as possible. There are three energy retailers who are licensed to do this initial connection; AGL, Origin and TRU energy. No one can be connected without making contact with one of these retailers.

Local MP Joanne Duncan builds anticipation for the arrival of natural gas in the region...only 37 years after the first homes in Victoria (in Carrum) were connected up.

The 2006 Yogyakarta earthquake (magnitude 6.4) killed over 5,700 people and injured tens of thousands more. Five thousand kilometres away, the compassion of people in Riddells Creek was being converted into practical help. the Rotary Club of Riddells Creek Quick action by Rotarian Peter King and President Pat Esse, saw a public appeal launched on 31 May for urgent anitarian aid for the Central Java earthquake victims. An on air interview on ABC 774 between John Faine, Rob Thornton (Java) and Peter King provided broad exposure to the appeal and resulted in the general public supporting it, along with our neighboring Rotary Clubs of Sunbury, Romsey/Lancefield, Broadmeadows, Strathmore and Craigieburn. A total of \$16,000 was raised and the majority quickly converted to the following goods which were provided and supported by Ray's Tent City 200 Tarps (10 x 10 and Geelong: 12 x 12); 40 Tents (12 x 14); 50 Tents (12 x 18); 50 Tents (12 x 20); 272






